


Memorial Garden.

Pingat Jasa Mala The Government of Malaysia have been issuing the Pingat Jasa Malaysia medal to all British and Commonwealth troops to commemorate the 50th Anniversary last year (2007) of Malayan

Independence Day (Medeka day) that happened on 31st August 1957. The medal is issued for the completion of a minimum of 90 days service from 31st August 1957 to August 1966 for those that served in Malaya, Singapore, Brunei, the North Borneo states of Sarawak and Sabah and Malaysia besides the three armed services the award is also made to police and administrators involved in the two campaigns "Malay Emergency" and "Indonesian Confrontation". The MHC suggests that applications be submitted as soon as is possible please.

The British Government are allowing us to receive this medal but we cannot wear it on official occasions. The National Malay & Borneo Veterans Association is having to administering the award on behalf of the High Commission of Malaysian as our own government will not do so. Those who think they are entitled, should submit a completed application form, which is also being issued posthumously, and forward it to Mr Fred Burden whose address is shown on the covering instruction to the application forms. Forms are available by downloading a copy from www.nmbva.co.uk and scrolling down to the Download PJM application form. This medal can be issued posthumously and an appropriate application form is available

RAF Duxford B of B "AT Home Day" 1955

When we last met, my old friend from squadron days Norman Buss handed me a yellowed copy of the flying programme for RAF Duxford's Battle of "At Home"day, dated 17th. September 1955 – complete with rusty staple!

It details take off & landing times, commencing at 13.58 – Spitfire take off (Mr. J. Quill) and finishing at 17.26 with the Canberra Formation Team – (Bassingbourne)

Among the displays listed were: Hurricane, Meteor Aerobatic Team(Duxford), Night Fighter Formation Fly Past, Balliol & Chipmunk Aerobatics (Flt.Lt.Thorne), Shackleton Fly Past, Hunter Aerobatics, F86D & Thunderstreak Fly Past, Valiant Display, Helicopter Display (Fisons), Supply Drop from a Dakota, Parachute Drop from a Hastings and last but not least a Vampire!Quite a show!

I noted that Flt.Lt. Thorne flew the Chipmunk and wondered if it was the same Len Thorne, who flew with the A.D.U. unit at Duxford in 1943, was an Old Dux member and who sadly passed away earlier this month? Also named, Flt.Lt. Tanner whom I remember from 65Sqn, F.O. Willis & F.O. Holloway Norman noted that the Spitfire was flown by J. Quill, and made the point that 65Sqn made a small contribution to improving the Spitfire's performance and quotes Aeroplane's obituary on Quill....... "Undoubtedly a thoroughbred from the start, the Spitfire nevertheless needed a great deal of work before it was deemed safe for young RAF pilots to fly. However, developed through many marks and variants, the Spitfire remained a first-line fighter throughout the war. During this entire period Quill was in charge of development and production flying, a job that he took very seriously—so seriously that he felt he must obtain first-hand combat experience. During August—September 1940 he was temporary released to 65Sqn at RAF Hornchurch, privately hoping that it would be a permanent appointment. On August 16th he shot down a Bf109 and two days later he shared a victory over a Heinke He111. His combat days were short-lived, but made Quill all the more determined to make the Spitfire an even better fighting machine."anyone remember them or the event and did it all go as planned I wonder?................

Mobile Phones FOUR THINGS YOU PROBABLY NEVER KNEW YOUR MOBILE PHONE COULD DO There are a few things that can be done in times of grave emergencies. Your mobile phone can actually be a life saver or an emergency tool for survival. Check out the things that you can do with it: FIRST
The Emergency Number worldwide for Mobile is 112. If you find yourself out of the coverage area of your mobile; network and there is an emergency, dial 112 and the mobile will search any existing network to establish the emergency number for you, and interestingly this number 112 can be dialed even if the keypad is locked. Try it out.

SECOND Have you locked your keys in the car?

Does your car have remote keyless entry? This may come in handy someday. Good reason to own a cell phone: If you lock your keys in the car and the spare keys are at home, call someone at home on their mobile phone from your cell phone. Hold your cell phone about a foot from your car door and have the person at your home press the unlock button, holding it near the mobile phone on their end. Your car will unlock. Saves someone from having to drive your keys to you. Distance is no object. You could be hundreds of miles away, and if you can reach someone who has the other 'remote' for your car, you can unlock the doors (or the trunk).

THIRD Hidden Battery Power

Imagine your mobile battery is very low. To activate, press the keys *3370# Your mobile will restart with this reserve and the instrument will show a 50% increase in battery. This reserve will get charged when you charge your mobile next time.

FOURTH How to disable a STOLEN mobile phone?

To check your Mobile phone's serial number, key in the following digits on your phon! e: * # 0 6 # A 15 digit code will appear on the screen. This number is unique to your handset. Write it down and keep it somewhere safe. When your phone get stolen, you can phone your service provider and give them this code. They will then be able to block your handset so even if the thief changes the SIM card, your phone will be totally useless. You probably won't get your phone back, but at least you know that whoever stole

it can't use/sell it either
